## Supervisors Set Goals and Priorities for 2026

The Solebury Board of Supervisors begins each January with a meeting devoted to outlining foreseeable priorities for the year, and 2026 is shaping up to be the year of the parks.

Developing a Master Plan for Lake Solebury (the former quarry property), planning the next steps for Solebury Green (the old flea market property on Route 202), and finalizing plans for the conversion of the historic Bond House in Aquetong Spring Park are all major projects for 2026.

“It’s going to be a very active year,” Board of Supervisors Chair Mark Baum Baicker said. “Three parks are looking at significant development, maybe not completing anything this year, but we are undertaking a significant development process.”

Lake Solebury, acquired by the Township just last year, will kick off its planning process when a resident committee is established this summer.

The Solebury Green Master Concept Planning process is well under way, and an updated plan is expected this spring. The plan adheres to community goals and values gathered over many months of committee meetings, public forums and workshops, and a resident survey.

The Bond House conversion is in the final stages of development, with grant funding lining up while program planning for the new facility is finalized.

Several ongoing priorities continue from last year, including trail system expansion, staff development, and modernization of the Township Building.

“There’s a whole host of issues that we know we will be facing every year, in addition to the ones we don’t know we’re going to be facing,” said Baum Baicker, “I think it’s important to have the conversation early in the year and be ready as best we can for all of this.”

## State Grant Helps Fund Bond House Conversion

Solebury was recently awarded a \$350,000 grant from the Local Share Account Statewide Grant Program and the Department of Community and Economic Development to update the historic Bond House at Aquetong Spring Park.

The grant secures two-thirds of the funds required to create an accessible public space within the currently-vacant structure. State Sen. Steve Santarsiero and State Rep. Tim Brennan were instrumental in helping secure the funds.

The project will make necessary updates to turn the house

from a residential building into a multi-use, public facility that is ADA accessible. Once updated, the building will be used for environmental and historic education and park-related activities organized by the Bucks

County Audubon Society and the Solebury Township Parks and Recreation Summer Camp.

The HVAC system will be replaced, and a new restroom and kitchenette will be added.

# Solebury Awarded State Grant for Former Quarry Purchase

The Pennsylvania Department of Conservation and Natural Resources has awarded Solebury Township with an \$800,000 grant toward the purchase of the former New Hope Crushed Stone property on Phillips Mill Road in Solebury Township.

The Township purchased the 166-acre property with its 60-acre lake in 2025 at a purchase price of \$3,200,000 and created an innovative partnership with Solebury School, which obtained a non-exclusive easement for trail and eventual water access to offset the purchase price. The purchase price, offset by Solebury School's easement purchase, reduced the Township's net cost to \$1,600,000. Furthermore, the Township determined that an existing structure on the property could be used as a Public Works storage facility, thereby saving \$350,000 the Township had budgeted for construction of such a facility at the municipal campus. The newly-announced DCNR grant further reduces the Township's net cost to less than \$500,000.

DCNR Secretary Cindy Adams Dunn stated that "the grant award is a recognition of outstanding recreation and conservation work."

"These funds will help accelerate the development of this unique property that has the potential to become an important local and regional recreation asset," said Solebury Board of Supervisors Chair Mark Baum Baicker. "We are so appreciative that DCNR recognized this and generously awarded us this grant. I want to specially thank Representative Tim Brennan and Senator Steve Santarsiero for their support in this process and our Township Manager, Chris Garges, for all the work he did in pursuing this grant."

Representative Brennan added: "The Solebury Quarry project reflects creativity, strong stewardship of the environment and local resources, as well as partnerships between state, local, and non-profit organizations. Good local government too often goes unnoticed, which makes me even more proud that the Commonwealth is supporting this project. Securing

state support is a win for our community's future and an acknowledgment of the vision and leadership of Solebury Township, The Solebury School, and my colleague Senator Steve Santarsiero."

"For years, this site was a source of frustration and disruption for the Solebury community," said Senator Santarsiero. "Seeing it transformed from a poorly managed quarry that caused real problems into a beautiful lake and future public park is a powerful example of what can happen when local, state, and community partners work together with a shared vision. This project will protect open space, restore the landscape, and preserve water resources while creating new opportunities for recreation and public safety. I'm incredibly proud of the collaboration that made this possible and grateful to DCNR, Solebury Township, Solebury School, Representative Tim Brennan, Township Manager Chris Garges, and all involved for turning a long-standing nuisance into a lasting public asset."

Solebury Township is in the process of developing long-term plans for the property. It has already made arrangements with Central Bucks EMS for an EMS station on the property, with the Bucks County Public Safety Dive Team for use as a training facility, and to have a dry hydrant placed on the property for emergency water access for local fire departments.



## ***Solebury's Newest Supervisor, Rickie Yudin***

The Board of Supervisors unanimously agreed to appoint Rickie Yudin to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Hanna Howe, for a term that will last until the end of 2027.

“My family and I have been proud to call Solebury home for the past five-plus years, and during that time, we’ve come to deeply appreciate its natu-



ral beauty, its sense of history, and its strong commitment to community,” Yudin said. “One of the things I value most about Solebury is that it’s a place where growth is approached thoughtfully. There’s a respect for balancing progress with preservation.”

Yudin has actively served on several committees, including the 202 Property Advisory Committee, the Parks and Recreation Board, and the Planning Commission, giving him a meaningful window into how the Township operates and how deeply residents care about collaboration, stewardship, and the character of our community. He said that those experiences have reinforced his belief that local government works best when decisions are trans-

parent, inclusive, and grounded in the needs and values of the people it serves.

Professionally, Yudin has spent more than the last decade as a leadership coach and consultant, after many years as an educator, helping organizations across the country strengthen their communication, collaboration, and strategic direction.

He said he brings to this role a commitment to listening carefully, honoring residents’ lived experiences, and helping turn shared values into thoughtful, actionable decisions.

“I’m grateful for this opportunity because I care deeply about the future of this community as a neighbor, parent, and resident invested in preserving what makes Solebury such a remarkable place to live,” Yudin said.

## **Pioneering Public Safety Technology:**

### ***Solebury Police Upgrade Body-Worn Cameras, Radios in Consolidated System***

The Solebury Township Police Department has become one of the first in the region to deploy Motorola Solutions’ innovative SVX Video Remote Speaker Microphone, an audio/video body camera system that seamlessly integrated with the APX NEXT portable radio system.

This technology combines a high-definition body-worn camera, remote speaker and microphone, and state-of-the-art two-way radio into a single wireless device. Launched by Motorola Solutions in April 2025, the SVX eliminates the need for separate body cameras and wired microphones, reducing officer gear weight while enhancing functionality.

Key features of the SVX with APX NEXT include clear communication, thanks to advanced noise suppression for reliable voice transmission in chaotic environments; evidential video captures with 1080p recording with features like Record-

After-the-Fact and automatic triggers; and AI integration for live language translation, note dictation, and technology to prioritize information exactly when needed.

The deployment marks a significant upgrade for STPD: improving officer safety, evidence collection, and transparency. By adopting this converged system early, Solebury Police are setting a benchmark for modern policing in Bucks County, where many departments already use body-worn cameras but now gain the advantages of integrated radio-video technology.



# Solebury Tallies 2025 Accomplishments

During 2025, the Solebury Board of Supervisors addressed over 228 issues. The Supervisors met at least 42 times during the year. In addition, all Supervisors are liaisons to multiple Township Committees and attended these monthly meetings.

Special mention should be made of the resident volunteer committees. Approximately 81 resident volunteers were members of numerous committees and other groups. They continue to provide the foundation of many Township activities and decisions. In aggregate, they met at least 96 times during the year. They discussed and analyzed important topics; many were eventually provided to the Board of Supervisors for consideration and implementation.

Additionally, Supervisors and Township staff participated in many community, contractor and resident meetings.

The following is a high-level summary of Township accomplishments:

## Administration

- Renovations to the Zoning & Permit offices were completed.
- Township staff advanced work on developing a dark skies ordinance.
- The Township website was redesigned and will be live within the next few weeks. Social media remains a key communication tool, steadily evolving and expanding its reach to nearly 1,000 followers.
- The Township engaged Kimmel Bogrette Architecture to prepare working plans to support funding applications and submitted a grant request to construct major portions of the Phase I trail system. The proposed project would extend the existing trail from Logan Square to Reeder Road and add a parking lot at the Solebury Green property.
- Solebury Township received an award from the Alternative Fuels Incentives Grant program for the purchase of the PD Chevy Blazer PPV EV.
- Submitted an EOI for the DVRPC Travel Options Program (TOP) for development of an electric shuttle program.
- Solebury Township was selected to receive 250 native tree seedlings from the Keystone 10 Million Trees Program.
- Supported the Board of Supervisors as they approved the installation of solar energy for the Township Municipal Building and Public Works Garage. This was motivated by concerns for environmental sustainability as well as significant financial savings.

## Comprehensive Plan

- The Comprehensive Plan Committee, in partnership with the Bucks County Planning Commission, worked throughout the year on updating the Township's Comprehensive Plan. This effort will be completed in 2026.
- Coordinated six Issue Forums leading to data collection efforts.
- When completed, the Comprehen-

sive Plan will set the priorities for the Township during the next 10 years.

## Deer Management

- Following a slight decrease in 2024, deer management efforts increased in 2025. The program will continue into 2026.

## Environmental Advisory Council / Sustainability Subcommittee

- Alternative Energy and EV Charging: New ordinances supporting alternative energy and electric vehicle charging were adopted.
- The Sustainability Subcommittee (SSC) held the Second Annual Sustainability Forum at New Hope -Solebury High School in partnership with the NHS Environmental Club.
- Created educational content shared on the Township website and social media platforms.
- First Community Energy Series Workshop held at Bucks County Audubon Society Honey Hollow Nature Center in conjunction with the SSC & EvolveEA (consultants).
- Held the 2025 Electronics Recycling Event at New Hope -Solebury High School.
- Held two Energy Transition Committee (ETC) Workshops in partnership with EvolveEA.
- Developed an Adopt a Township Road Program (AATR) in partnership with Hugh Marshall to launch in early 2026.
- Organized a yard tree giveaway in partnership with PECO and PHS.

## Farming

- The Farm Committee prepared a draft ordinance amendment addressing farmworker housing. The draft is under review by the Township Solicitor and will be presented to the Board of Supervisors for authorization to advertise.
- Supported the Board of Supervisors to approve Agricultural Accessory Use Ordinance.

## Financial Overview

- Moody's has reaffirmed the Township's Aa1 bond rating, citing its strong financial position and a trend of consistent improvement in recent years. Township staff participated in a recent review with Moody's, during which the agency confirmed the rating and provided a stable and positive outlook.
- The Township is able to address all operating expenses within the current real estate tax millage level, despite rising costs associated with fire protection and emergency medical services. Existing revenues allowed the Township to support the first year of a volunteer firefighter stipend program and to continue providing financial assistance to Township volunteer fire companies and emergency services organizations for annual operating needs and future capital funding, without increasing the tax rate.
- The Township realized approximately \$275,000 in additional interest earnings, attributable to favorable economic conditions and the successful renegotiation of banking relationships to secure higher interest rates. In addition, Land Preservation Funds continued to be invested through the U.S. Treasury's State and Local Government Series (SLGS) securities program, allowing the Township to achieve higher yields while eliminating arbitrage risk and maintaining compliance with federal investment requirements.

## Historical Architectural Review Board

- Processed 20 HARB and Repair / Replacement In-Kind applications.
- Assisted with proposed minimum maintenance survey & drafted annual letter to homeowners.

## Land Preservation

- Two new conservation easements were established, protecting more than 40 acres of land.

- This includes the former Paxson Hill Farm and property owned by the Nakashima family.
- Continued with community outreach efforts to discuss land preservation owner as well as community advantages.

## Park & Recreation Department

- Aquetong Spring Park
  - Installed benches along the Bird Loop Trail and held a "lottery" for purchasing by the public; expanded educational material available for residents along the Bird Loop Trail.
  - Fortified the existing dam at the spring by replacing the stone path over the dam, and increasing signage directing residents.
  - Hosted the first Egg Hunt for Hounds event during the Easter season to promote and support clean, safe disposal of dog waste.
- Laurel Park
  - Completed a total renovation of the pickleball courts including new court surface and striping, new nets and posts, and repairs to the chain link fencing.
  - Added International Play Equipment Manufacturers Association certified engineered wood fiber safety surfacing to the existing playground to enhance safety standards.
  - Refurbished and repainted the interior bathrooms in the snack stand.
- Pat Livezey Park
  - Completed construction of two soccer kickboards at the lower park athletic fields.
  - Added International Play Equipment Manufacturers Association certified engineered wood fiber safety surfacing to the existing playground to enhance safety standards.
  - Successfully completed five weeks of Outdoor Summer Camp.
- Contracted with consultants Kimmel-Bogrette to begin the Master Concept Planning process for Solebury Green and deliver designs that reflect the goals and values of the community. Work began on updating this plan, which is progressing well and expected to be nearly complete by early 2026.

## Permitting

- Responded to 24 property complaints with letters or stop work orders, resolving 19 of those complaints.
- Launched a paperless permitting system (portal) in January 2025 for resi-

dential and commercial construction, and zoning permits. Applicants can now upload documents and pay electronically, resulting in a more efficient process and positive feedback from the community.

- As of November 2025, 461 permits were issued and 257 Certificates of Occupancy.
- Implemented the Fire Inspection Program in July 2025 in coordination with local fire departments. Introduced a synchronized Knox Box installation system for commercial businesses and residential properties with driveway gates.

## Planning Commission

- Supported the review of the following ordinances:
  - Lighting Ordinance & Warehouse
  - Electric Vehicle Charging Station
  - Fire Code
  - Agricultural Accessory Use
  - Housing for Agricultural Workers
  - Alternative Energy
  - Preserved Land Setback Amendment
- Assisted with two land development applications
- Reviewed 3 Conditional Use applications

## Police Department

- Transitioned to new handguns equipped with Red Dot Sights, improving both accuracy and safety.
- Secured a \$45,000 grant to purchase Red Dot Sight handguns, portable shields, and less-lethal 40mm shot launchers.
- Obtained \$58,000 grant to implement Pathfinder, a new records management system that modernizes reporting and recordkeeping processes.
- Purchased solar-powered, portable speed signs to better educate motorists about their driving speeds with the intent of enhancing traffic safety.
- Placed the Department's first all-electric vehicle into service-one of the first law enforcement EVs in Bucks County.
- Hosted the first annual Bike Rodeo, promoting bike safety for children and families. Organized the first annual Fill a First Responder Food Drive to support local food banks. Successfully participated in the Drug Take Back Day, collecting unused or expired medications for safe disposal.
- Published the first Annual Report in the Department's history, providing transparency and accountability to the community.
- The Police Dept also held another highly successful National Night Out

in August and Halloween Movie Night in October.

## Public Works Department

- Litigation related to Old Carversville Road was settled. Township Admin Staff also secured outside funding through the Bucks County Dirt and Gravel Road Program to cover nearly half of the required improvements. Related work is scheduled for completion in 2026.
- North Pointe Development Road Work
  - Completed an Oil and Chip treatment followed on all roads in the development.
  - Mastic repairs to 82 storm inlets and full crack sealing.
  - Collectively, this two-year project improved road preservation and drainage.
- Balanced day-to-day Township operations with the added responsibility of maintaining the Lake Solebury property. The department coordinated with contractors to secure competitive bids for immediate needs and long-term projects. Cleanup efforts included removal of three boats; one floating dock; one pontoon boat base; two large tires; two 30-foot pipes; trash, debris, and plastic bottles.
- Cleared all offices and bays of debris at the lower structures. Recycled three loads of metal, with proceeds provided to the Township accounts.

## Quarry

- Lake Solebury Acquisition – The Township purchased the former New Hope Crushed Stone quarry property (Lake Solebury) for \$3.2 million. With the negotiated lease agreement with Solebury School, release of a lien with the DEP, utilizing existing structures on the property and the recent Department of Conservation and Natural Resources grant of \$800,000, the net acquisition cost to the Township is less than \$500,000.
- The former New Hope Crushed Stone quarry property has been named "Lake Solebury". This reference will remain for two years until the Township is able to determine the community preference for the permanent name.
- Approximately by the middle of 2026 interviews will commence for the resident Lake Solebury Committee members who will assist with developing concepts for the 166-acre Township property.

## Zoning Hearing Board

- Fifteen applications were reviewed.

# Solebury Police Offer Winter Weather Driving Tips

## Slow Down

- Everything takes longer on snow-covered roads—accelerating, stopping, turning.
- Drive slowly and allow extra time to maneuver.
- Even treated roads can still be slippery.

## Avoid Cruise Control

- Never use cruise control in winter conditions.

## Be Prepared

- Scraper & snow brush
- Warm clothing (coat, hat, gloves)
- Blanket
- First aid kit
- Flashlight
- Tire chains
- Matches
- Nonperishable food

## Windshield & Tires

- Carry plenty of windshield washer fluid (de-icers can stick to glass).
- Ensure your tires have good tread.

## Give Snowplows Space

- Let plow drivers do their job—keep a safe distance.

## Accelerate & Decelerate Slowly

- Apply gas gradually to regain traction and avoid skids.
- Take extra time to slow down for stops.

## Increase Following Distance

- Normal dry pavement distance: 3–4 seconds
- Winter conditions: 8–10 seconds

## Know Your Brakes

- Use threshold braking:
  - Heel on the floor
  - Ball of foot applies firm, steady pressure

## Hills

- Don't power up hills—extra gas causes spinning.
- Build inertia before the hill, then reduce speed at the crest.
- Avoid stopping on hills.

## Stay Home

- If you don't need to go out, don't. Even if you drive well others may not.

## What a “Snow Emergency” Means in Solebury Township

When a snow emergency has been declared for Solebury Township and roads are extremely icy and rapidly becoming snow covered, any vehicle left parked or found disabled on Township roadways will be ticketed and towed at the owner's expense.

It is unlawful to park a vehicle or to allow a vehicle to remain parked anywhere on any designated snow emergency route, listed below.

# Tax Collection Firm Warns That USPS Delays Threaten Tax Timing

Keystone Collections Group, which collects Earned Income Tax for Solebury and several other municipalities, is alerting its customers to recurring mail delivery problems that could lead to a late or missing tax payment, or a lack of awareness of important tax changes and announcements.

Based on its own observations and publicly reported complaints against the U.S. Postal Service, Keystone warns of increasing problems with lost and significantly delayed mail, correctly addressed envelopes that are erroneously returned as “Undeliverable as Addressed,” and missing or illegible postmarks.

Keystone encourages taxpayers to use their secure, online e-file system to pay their local taxes, download forms and get updated tax information. Visit their website at [KeystoneCollects.com](http://KeystoneCollects.com).

If using the online service is not an option for you, be sure to mail forms and payment well in

advance of the deadline, and consider using Certified Mail, Return Receipt, or Certificate of Mailing services available at your local post office.

USPS has recently clarified that a postmark is timestamped when it arrives at a processing facility, which is not always the date it was mailed. A sender can request a “manual postmark” at the post office service counter to ensure that the postmark aligns with the actual date of mailing.

If you experience any postal delays or returned mail relating to your local taxes, Keystone wants you to let them know. Call them toll-free at (866) 539-1100.
