The increase in millage raises support for fire services from \$365,000 to \$425,000 and

for the Free Library of New Hope & Solebury from \$60,000 to \$90,000.

The increase also includes matching funds in the amount of \$225,000 for the nearly \$1.7 million in grants received by the Township for trail linkages. These combined moneys will allow the Township to

complete a portion of the Solebury Trail that will head south from Canal Park along River Road and connect with an existing segment that begins at Eagle Fire Co., runs along the New Hope-Solebury School District fields, and ends at River Road.

It's Tax Season

EIT/LST Filing Reminder

Solebury residents now file and pay the 1% Earned Income Tax (EIT) and the \$52 Local Services Tax (LST) through the Bucks County-wide tax collection firm, Keystone Collections Group.

The 1% EIT is assessed by Solebury Township (0.5%) and the New Hope-Solebury School District (0.5%) on the earned income of Solebury residents as well as that of individuals who live outside the Township but work in Solebury.

Earned income and net profits from all sources for a specific calendar year that total less than \$5,000 are exempt from the EIT.

E-filing of both taxes is available on the Keystone website.

re you ready for winter:

Time to Think About De-Icing Solutions

inter is rapidly approaching, and forecasters say it could be a snowy one. It's time to place a snow shovel and stiff-bristled broom where you can readily access them.

While you're at it, take a moment to consider the different ice-melting options for days when de-icing is necessary. By using these products judiciously, you can avoid injuries and help protect the environment.

Because no ice-melting solution is completely benign, the best way to treat an area that tends to get icy is to apply a thin layer of the product before snow falls, regardless of the de-icer you use.

Salt-Based Products

Rock salt, or sodium chloride, the traditional ice melter, works when the temperature is above 15 degrees. It is easy to use, easy to store, and relatively inexpensive.

Other salts, such as calcium chloride or magnesium chloride, are often present in lower temperatures.

Potential Impacts:

These products are extremely caustic and can burn skin on contact. Children, with their sensitive skin and eyes, must be especially careful. They can even cause a pet's Nitrogen-Based Products skin to blister.

death, if ingested (e.g., if a pet licks some off its paws or fur).

They may harm plants and disturb soil composition.



They can damage wood, concrete, pavers, bricks, and other surfaces.

They can attract wildlife in search of commercial ice-melt products that work at salt, who lick road surfaces, increasing the chance of collision.

> Runoff that picks up these products can carry large amounts of chloride to the water supply, increasing the corrosive effects of the water.

Urea, a nitrogen-based fertilizer, is a They can cause severe discomfort, even less caustic ice-melter and thus poses less threat to the skin and various surfaces.

> Several commercial ice-melting products marketed as safe for the environment and pets contain nitrogen (and also tend to be expensive).

Potential Impacts:

When applied in the quantity necessary to melt ice, the large amount of nitrogen left behind can inhibit flowering, damage roots, and eventually kill plants.

Runoff that picks up this product can carry large amounts of nitrogen to waterways, causing algae blooms that cloud water, decrease oxygen supply, and promote mosquito growth.

Other Products

Sand, kitty litter, and gravel provide traction on ice, hopefully making it less slippery.

Potential Impacts:

Runoff that picks up these products can carry them to waterways, causing an accumulation of silt.

Runoff that picks up these products can clog drains and storm sewers. 🏖

Primrose Creek Watershed Association Receives Grants to Provide Community Education

hanks to three grants from Verizon, IBM, and the Western Pennsylvania Conservancy and Dominion Foundation, the Primrose Creek Watershed Association expanded its educational offerings in 2014 and will continue its outreach in the coming year, association president John Winterbottom reported.

2014 Offerings

Verizon funding enabled the association to offer the "We All Live Downstream"

to offer the "We All Live Downstream" series in 2014—a series of three classes emphasizing the importance of watersheds to the health of communities.

Between 35 and 50 middle school and high school students from the New Hope-Solebury and Bristol school districts participated in each of the following series components.

Macroinvertebrates: In classroom and field experiences, students gained an overview of the importance of macroinvertebrates to watershed health.

Sum of the Parts: Students received cards representing streamside properties, which they could "develop" as they wished, then joined the cards together to gain an understanding of how upstream development decisions impact those made downstream.

Watershed Decisions: Students roleplayed that they were neighborhood watershed association volunteers who had to decide how to spend grant money to improve an impaired creek. *Enviroscape:* Students used a tabletop model of a watershed to investigate how watersheds become polluted.

Understanding a Stream: Students explored the mapping of physical stream characteristics (e.g., flow, depth, velocity, slope, substrate) and elementary stream chemical tests that evaluate stream conditions.

Instructors for the series included association members Mark Cowell and Carol

Cope; Mary Ellen Noon and Meghan Rogalus of the Bucks County Conservation District; Ian Kindle and Sarah Berg, who are associated with Delaware Canal State Park; and Diane Smith from Bucks County Audubon Society, who also coordinated the use of Honey Hollow Environmental Education Center, where the "We All Live Downstream" classes were conducted, John said.

Planning for 2015

Financial support from IBM and the Western Pa. Conservancy and Dominion Foundation will be used to provide education and encourage watershed awareness in 2015, the association president said, and the group's education committee is in the process of finalizing the 2015 curriculum.

"This has been a fortunate year for grant funding," John observed. "However, we

never lose site of how this has come about—our membership. Our members are crucial in demonstrating to our grantors and elected officials that our community cares about natural sustainability, and membership funds are a vital source of support for our programs."

What's more, he added, membership funds "help restore and protect the watershed and lend strength to our voices as we advocate for green approaches to our community."

Association member Kevin Morrissey, director of the association's Funding Committee, worked with Veri-

zon to fund the "We All Live Downstream" series; association vice-president Hope Blaythorne coordinated the IBM Grant; and Education Committee Director Carol Cope helped with the Western Pennsylvania Conservancy and Dominion Foundation grant.

Staffing levels. Along with the current full-time staffing level, the 2015 budget provides for hiring a part-time temporary employee to support the Township administration.

Police Dept.

The Police Dept. budget sets capital funds aside each year for the scheduled replacement of vehicles and other law enforcement equipment. This year that amount went down because the Township recently finished purchasing new radios the department had been saving for across the last several years.

Under the department's annual schedule of vehicle replacement, the Township will replace the two oldest police vehicles with new ones covered by extended warranties (\$80,000).

Other planned purchases include the replacement of outdated laptops and other computers, as well as the purchase of a new message board, for a total cost of \$30,000.

The Police Dept. budget also includes a slight increase in officer training, as well as a small increase in the cost of traffic enforcement in response to resident complaints about speeding in areas of the Township.

Finally, the department has budgeted \$15,000 toward accreditation by the Pennsylvania Chiefs of Police Association. This rigorous, independent, standards-based review helps police departments evaluate and improve their performance and ultimately validates that local departments are operating effectively and professionally.

Parks & Recreation Dept.

In addition to managing the work on the Solebury Trail, described above, the Parks & Recreation Dept. will use about \$33,000 in capital funds to continue repairs to the Judy House at Ingham Spring Park. A heater, windows, and stolen copper fixtures will all be replaced, along with some other repairs.

Other capital projects include the replacement of roofs that are at least 18 years old on buildings at Laurel Park and Pat Livezey

Park, and the installation of new insulation and security doors for the building at Pat Livezey Park.

Within the department's operating fund, projected new expenses include the printing of a Solebury Trail map; planning for a "Community Day;" and mowing and maintenance of both Ingham Spring Park and the Lumberville site.

The Parks & Recreation Dept. operating budget is offset by Summer Adventure Camp revenues as well as fundraising activities run by volunteers.

All sports programs are self-funding, with all expenses covered by the respective organization's registration fees. In addition, local soccer and baseball organizations each contribute \$6,000 per year toward Township expenses, and they pay for field maintenance out of their own funds. The football organization is charged an annual maintenance fee based on field usage.

According to Parks & Recreation Director Dudley Rice, community volunteers and local partnerships contribute to the department's success. Critical partners include NH-S School District, which provides facilities for Solebury's Summer Adventure Camp; Lambertville-New Hope Winter Festival, which

helps support several local organizations in addition to Solebury Parks and Recreation; and individual sports organizations.

Thanks to its partners and volunteers, the Parks & Recreation Dept. is able to provide residents with free programs throughout the year, like AED/CPR certification and Halloween Safety Awareness.

Public Works Dept.

Solebury is planning construction on a new Public Works facility this year at an estimated two-year cost of \$2.7 million, funded by loans. The new facility will be located on two lots next to the Township Building, and as part of the project, in year two a portion of the existing facility will be renovated to accommodate the Police Dept.

Public Works Director Dennis Carney—also the Township Manager—recently updated the Public Works department's Road Maintenance Program for 2015, which lays out a five-year maintenance plan for Township infrastructure.

In keeping with that plan, this year a total of \$300,000 will be used for milling, paving, overlay, and tar-and-chip treatments of local roads, and \$80,000 will be used to complete a combination of planned bridge repairs and repairs identified as necessary during annual bridge inspections.


In addition the department has budgeted \$50,000 for a new roller that will provide more flexibility for in-house paving projects and repairs.

Other

The Township Manager noted that the Natural Resource Protection Fund will support several items in the new year, including \$5,000 for a deer count, \$8,000 to continue the state-mandated (Act 537) sanitary sewage study, and \$10,000 for stormwater management and other stormwater-related studies.


In addition, the fund will finance ongoing tree planting (\$3,000) and the Township's membership in the Audubon Bird Town program (\$850).
