MEETING MINUTES

Zoom recording was turned on.

I. The meeting was called to order.

II. Approval of Minutes – July 26, 2023

• Upon a motion by Mr. Yudin, seconded by Ms. Stock-Allen, the minutes of the July 26, 2023 meeting were unanimously approved.

III. Presentations

A. Rickie Yudin – Park Pavilions and Shelters

The presentation's purpose was to share ideas and examples of structures/group use spaces that could be utilized in various ways on the 202 Property and leave the committee with "more questions than answers." Focus was on examples of group use spaces that shared commonalities in relation to the categories of: Functions, Style, and Usage (copy of which is attached). Questions and brief discussions were included during the presentation.

- 1. Highlights Included: Spaces using artistic custom designs that are central and serve as focal points; small structures that blend-in and serve as rest areas spaced throughout a property-- encourages use throughout a location; multiple structures/spaces that are uniquely designed/sized for different uses ie: a resting spot and an event space; Multiple structures of mixed materials for seating/shade/eating designed around central green space structures' design and materials reflect area's identity ie: the local textile industry; non-permanent structures assembled for a limited time, artistic and custom designs with purpose tables and chairs underneath structure to encourage rest and eating for public use; structures that blend into the view rather than stand out; two story structures that allow for more use options in a smaller footprint.
- 2. <u>Additional Highlights:</u> .3D printed gazebos that allowed for seating and multiple locations around property due to smaller footprint but are unique in material and design. Considering fully open/semi-closed/closed structures and the use options/limitations that come with each. Additional considerations that come with choosing any structure/group use space.

B. Nancy Stock Allen – Pop-up Events for Community Spaces

*Presentation opened with a map of 202 Property. Map outlined some of the designated flood areas and provided information regarding flood area and wetland classifications. This was followed by a YouTube video of FDR Park, a park with similar challenges in regard to wetlands/flood areas and how the FDR Parks Department is working to address those challenges. Sharing ideas/information from spaces with similar challenges, allows committee members to reflect on options for future recommendations.

**This presentation's purpose was to share ways in which Pop-up Events can help introduce and define a park space. Then further down the road, how Pop-ups can cultivate community in an established park. (copy of which is attached). Questions and a discussion session followed.

- 1. Presentation Highlights Included: How Pop-up Park Programs are not necessarily run by a Parks and Recreation Dept. but how neighborhood groups, associations, non-profits, and educational institutions can initiate community-led recreational, arts, culture, and educational programming with events such as: picnics, performing arts events, sport/recreation day, movie night, or other art/cultural events. Events are small to medium in size, open to the community, and free. Example: using National Farmer's Market Week as an opportunity to hold a week-long event.
- 2. Additional Highlights: Examples of events in Doylestown, Philadelphia, Perkasie, were provided. Bethlehem wellness event with examples of supporting/coordinated pop-up events in their various parks. Plumsted community yard sale at a local park. New Hope picnic in the park date night event.
- 3. Pop-up: Recycling events, fitness and yoga, archery, lawn chess/checkers, mini-golf.
- 4. Events that involve local organizations or skilled volunteers. Examples: build your own bird feeder with the Audubon Society, young child summer reading program or poetry event sponsored by the local Library. Pop-up Seasonal: master gardeners could develop temporary gardens. If water features are integrated into 202 Property, there could be: Wetland Educational Events with volunteers from Aquetong Watershed or Primrose Creek Associations.
- 5. Introducing 202 Property to the Community via Pop-ups:
 - a. Temporary play spaces
 - b. Events ie: Art in the Park, Bugs in the Grass, Water and Bubbles, Nature Scavenger Hunt;
 - c. Kiosks to: explain space and scheduled improvements, or for community to provide feedback and opinions.
 - d. Pop-up Engagements: to obtain feedback for property





A pop-up park that has been described as a "fleeing urban oasis" will open Friday, Sept. 21 in Doylestown.

This is the fourth year residents have worked to put up the pop-up park in downtown Doylestown. This year's park will be situated at the corner of West State and Hamilon streets. It will be open through Sunday, Sept. 23.

The project is done in concert with the nationwide PARK(ing) Day, an event that began in California in 2005.

Organizers say the temporary park is a boost for local businesses. "Restaurants and shops near the parks have reported a 20-25 percent increase in sales during the weekend-long event," organizers said in the announcement.

Jasmine Craig, a Doylestown area resident involved in the project, said in the press release that the park showcases "how to do community well by transforming public spaces into beautiful and functional, community gathering spots."





The number of parks throughout Philadelphia increases dramatically each year on the third Friday in September, when activists, artists, architects, and other citizens transform metered parking spaces into temporary public parks. Known as PARKing) Day, this annual event re-imagines the possibilities of 160 square feet of public space. The event celebrates parks and other public spaces in cities across the country, and raises awareness of the need for more pedestrian-friendly spaces in our urban areas.

PARK(ing) Day was founded by Rebar, a San Francisco art and design studio, in 2005 to raise awareness of the need for green spaces in urban environments. Philadelphia celebrated PARK(ing) Day for the first time in 2008 with over 25 installations for relaxing, cycling, creating art, education, and socializing.



Farmers markets are located across Fairfax County on a variety of sites, including Park Authority property, parking lots, schools, places of worship, and at metro stations. Farmer's markets are typically held on a weekly basis at each location. Typically they include stands with tents and food trucks and vendors that provide fresh, local produce and goods. A few locations of Farmers Markets are Springfield Town Center, Huntington, McLean, and Annandale. The requirements for permitting a Farmers Market depend on the location and the type of vendors/items provided. They may require a temporary special permit through the Zoning Permit Review Branch.










Families and outdoor enthusiasts alike, come join our Park Ranger Division in celebrating Earth Day on the boardwalk.
